
Instructions Following Your Hand/Wrist/Elbow Surgery

First follow-up visit after surgery

- Call the office the day after your surgery and make an appointment for the next week to see Dr. Pruzansky, unless specified otherwise.

Dressing & Wound Care

- Keep the original dressing on until you are seen by Dr. Pruzansky.
- Do **not** get your dressing wet. You may take a bath by covering your arm in a garbage bag or other waterproof bag; tie it securely with rubber bands and / or tape.
- Keep your dressings as clean as possible.

Swelling and Discoloration

- You will notice some swelling of your hand – this is normal. **Elevate your hand above the level of your heart.** Shorten the strap of the sling or remove the sling and place your elbow on a sitting table with your wrist leaning on a stack of books so that your hand is higher than both your elbow and your heart. When you sleep, place your hand on several pillows.
- You may notice a bluish discoloration of your fingers. This is also normal. This discoloration may change from blue to purple to green to yellow then will slowly go away over a few weeks time.

Discomfort

- You will experience some pain and discomfort after surgery. By the third day, this pain usually decreases significantly.
- You will be given a prescription for pain medication. Take the medication as prescribed.
- If the discomfort is mild, you can take one or two Tylenol 4 – 6 hours as needed, **instead** of the prescribed pain medication.

Temperature

- A temperature of up to **101.5°F** is common for the first three days after surgery.
- If your temperature is elevated above 101.5° F, call the office.

Exercise

- Unless instructed otherwise, you may gently open and close your fingers.
- Do not perform any exercises that cause you to sweat until you discuss this at your first postoperative office visit.
